### **Obituary**

Deacon John "Johnny" Greene passed away peacefully on May 22, 2018. He was born on August 24, 1929 to the late George and Virginia Green in Sheldon, South Carolina in Beaufort County. At nine months old, he was adopted by Henry and Beatrice Lockwood. He often told stories about how proud he was that his father, Henry Lockwood, was "the A-1 carpenter in all of Beaufort County."

Deacon John was educated in Sheldon, South Carolina and upon graduation, he joined the U.S. Navy. When he became too ill to attend church, he would watch *The Jimmy Swaggart Telecast* from morning until bedtime.
